EGM

The EGM took place on Friday 4th March with over 30 people attending. It was agreed to adopt a constitution. You will find a copy accompanying this newsletter. This was done so the group can be in the position to support any intiatives that may arise in this new era of greater community involvement. The constitution was made as simple as possible to make it a doucmument that did not constrain the group too much.

There was a good disucssion about the constitution and various new intiatives. At the end of the evening there was a presentation by Axcess cycles about the electric bikes they sell. Several members had a trial ride round the car park; it would be fair to report that people were impressed.

LSTF

The Council has decided to make a bid for funds from the Local Sustainable Transport Fund. This was announced by Central Government at the turn of the year. Local councils are invited to bid for projects that would encourage sustainable transport. After Officers attended a briefing it has been decided that the bid is to be based on a theme of a sustainable tourism with the central theme of walking and cycling

£560 million have been set aside for England, excluding London. The funding is to be spread over 3 years. There are various restrictions on how the money is spent so it has been decided to make a bid, which will not be in excess of £5 million. The bid has to be spent in two ways; 40% capital (cycle tracks, footpaths etc) and 60% revenue, schemes to promote cycling and walking etc)

There are a two overriding criteria that the bid must to address; a) it will support the local economy and b) reduce carbon emissions. More information is on that of the DfT.

As has now become apparent there is a large emphasis on involvement of the community; including groups such as ourselves but also commercial enterprises. The phrase matched funding is one that has become familiar to many who have become involved in this kind of thing. There is no figure set by the government but there is an

expectation that if bids are to be successful that they must demonstrate a commitment of all kinds of partners in a local community. At the present the Council has identified 4 strands to the bid:

- Public transport linkages,
- · National Cycle Network improvements
- Rights of Way network
- Signage, information, publicity and advertising.

The bid itself has two parts to it. A statement of intent by the beginning of June this year and a detailed bid by Feb 2012. The government has indicated that the decisions will be made quickly so bidders can begin their work as soon as possible after that date.

We are asking all members to contact the committee with any ideas that they may have. Officers are keen to hear our ideas to show they are involving the community. The group has been in contact already with a range of people over this project making them aware its existence of encouraging them to become involved. We have also met with the Council on a number of occasions to learn about the fund and to demonstrate our commitment to be involved as much as possible.

Mince Pie Ride

It took place as usual from Alverstone Village Hall. It was a smaller number this year due to the cold and miserable weather. The ride included a bracing stint along Sandown sea front but of course this made the mulled and warm mince pies even more appetizing.

Wight Wheels Challenge

After the great success of last year's Challenge, the Wight Wheels Cycle Challenge is being run again this year, between May 9th and May 29th.

The Challenge is a project aimed at



encouraging more people to cycle on the getting works by Island and employers to compete with each other to see who can get the highest percentage of staff on a bike for a minimum of 10 minutes, at some point during the three week period in May. Employers sign up (for free) and then staff log their bike trips on: www.wightwheelschallenge.org.uk. more staff that log trips, the higher the "score" the employer gets. There are five different team categories depending on numbers of staff at the organisation.

As well as being a fun way to engage people in cycling, there are great prizes to be won! Cinema tickets for "new" cyclists, a brand new hybrid bike, vouchers to be spent at cycling shops, meals at restaurants, health club memberships, even tree climbing adventures.....lots to encourage those otherwise reluctant to get the bike out of the shed.

Bike to Work Scheme

Many of you will have heard of this scheme. It is now offered by a variety of employers. It allows people to buy cycles and equipment at a preferential price via salary sacrifice. It is a scheme that has government backing. Many Island employers are taking part in the scheme with a good response from a wide range of companies. The Isle of Wight Council has decided to withdraw from the scheme for its employees. The reasons cited have been the difficulties administering the scheme and securing a new contract with the administrative body that does the work on behalf of the government.

What a shame this has happened when the Island is bidding for money for sustainable transport (see overleaf) and the launch of the Eco Island initiative.

Please write to your Councillor and ask the Council to re-consider their decision. CycleWight have written already but the more who contact Councillors and ask for an explanation – the more likely something is going to happen.
